Greetings all,

Although our last ride together was the one to Okains Bay on the 11th of March I can report that a small group of four riders did indulge in some riding therapy by travelling over to the West Coast for a two-night stopover at the Carters Beach Top 10 Campground. Me, Jeff Bannister, Alan Rigg and Paul Tayler left Woodend around 10:15am on Friday 20 March for what was an eventful and enjoyable weekend away. Eventful in that we did our best to dodge the rain that forced us to rethink our route on numerous occasions. Enjoyable due to the usual Retreads banter and jolly good company both on the road and back at our 2-bedroom motel at the campground.

Donaldeo's restaurant just down the road from the Top10 Campground was a welcome oasis for us. The hosts do a great job in interacting with their clientele and always go out of their way to please. Along the Blackball road to Ikamatua and Reefon for lunch (and another register to sign) was the order of the day. Wednesday ride to Hanmer 8 January 2020: Large turnout for this 'early in the New Year' picnic at the DOC domain at Hanmer. A short but popular ride on a very hot Summer day. We scattered ourselves around an otherwise empty picnic area with most seeking shade from the mid-day sun. Our group of 14 took the opportunity to catch up on what happened over the Christmas break and discussed plans for the rest of the holiday period.

Sunday ride to Lake Tekapo 26 January 2020: Traffic on the mostly boring mid-Canterbury roads aided by a desire to not get mixed up with too much tourist traffic saw our group halt our ride and settled instead for lunch at Fairlie before turning back home.

Wednesday ride to Staverley Store 12 February 2020: Always a popular spot for riders on a sparsely trafficked tourist route. A relatively short ride for our group out to enjoy the countryside in the company of friends.

Sunday ride to Blackball 23 February 2020: A great ride. Brilliant riding conditions enjoyed by 7 riders. 5 riders met at Mobil Yaldhurst at 9:30 before setting out on the trek over to the West Coast via Arthur's Pass and Greymouth to arrive at Formally the Blackball Hilton at around 1:30pm. Barry caught up with us at Springfield as did Scott. Jeff called it quits at Arthurs Pass and returned home early. Along the way Brian just about ran out of duct tape having delved into his tool kit on no fewer than 4 occasions to assist other riders in the group having trouble with their gear. No one ran out of fuel this time though ... Mine hosts at the Blackball hotel were up to their very best and mixing banter with the locals was a highlight of this stopover. Late though before we set off home added to by a long coffee stop at Maruia Springs. I racked up 550 km on the wee-Strom for the day and arrived home around 7:45pm.
